As you consider comprehensive health care reform for America, I urge you to proceed carefully and focus on getting any reform legislation “right” rather than be bound by arbitrary deadlines.

I do agree that our current health care system is in need of reform and appreciate the efforts of Congress to control rising health care costs and provide coverage options for all Americans.
